1	<p>Mode of Teaching Blended Teaching Flipped Classroom Remedial Classes (As per the needs of our students)</p> <p>The faculty at GC Theog believes that no single teaching method fits all students or subjects. The teachers have adopted and incorporated multiple modes of teaching based on the course requirements and student needs. The lecture method is efficient for delivering the core concepts of the course. It is blended with the active use of internet-enabled smartboards by all the teachers at the college. The college has 14 smartboard-enabled classrooms. Flipped classrooms offer a mix of independent learning and active participation, hence it is periodically employed by all teaching departments. Therefore, by adopting the right teaching mode as per the learners' needs, teachers ensure more effective, engaging, and inclusive learning experiences for all students.</p> <p>The college has 25 full-time faculty members, who are well qualified, experienced, competent and take personal interest and responsibility. As a result, the learning process becomes more creative and dynamic. Moreover, the students come from different socio- economic backgrounds, diverse abilities and attributes, hence, every effort is made to cater to the requirements of such a diversified group by using appropriate and varied student centric methods of teaching and learning. Teachers assess the academic proficiency of students based on their performance in classroom discussions and tests/assignments. The needs of slow learners are particularly attended in remedial classes/tutorial sessions. The record of such students and the extra hours put in are meticulously maintained at the end of the register to compute and analyze student progression.</p> <p>Classroom discussions, presentations, quizzes et. cetera. are also regularly organized to make learning more effective and meaningful. All the Labs are well equipped. The college magazine provides a platform for improving writing skills and analytical comprehension of the students. Collaborative learning is promoted among the students by their active participation in NCC, NSS, <i>Rovers and Rangers</i> and activities of cultural and other clubs/societies. Educational and field tours are also organized to enhance the learning process. 'Academic Calendar' for the entire academic year which includes space for curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

Whether Learning Outcomes Defined

Yes, the *Program Outcomes* (POs), *Course Outcomes* (COs) and *Learning Outcomes* (LOs) are defined in all the subjects and courses separately. They are shared on the college website as hyperlinks. Moreover, they are discussed in detail in the *Orientation Program* for the 1st year students which is held annually. Thereafter, these are again discussed threadbare in the subject specific classes and a time of 10 days is given to the students in case they wish to opt for a new Elective course.

Curriculum Enrichment Activities (Projects, Surveys, Educational Tours and Industry Visits)

The faculty thoroughly believes in the merits of experiential learning. Therefore, various teaching departments of the college undertook a range of activities which are as follows:

Projects

Zoology

On 28 February 2024, the students of the *Department of Zoology* celebrated *National Science Day* by making several projects and models which depicted various phenomena such as Hemodialysis, Sericulture, Urine Formation, working of the heart and DNA model.

Botany

The students of the *Department of Botany* celebrated *National Science Day* by making several models/projects on themes such as: green energy consumption and production, purification of water and azotobacter on *National Science Day*, which was celebrated on 28 February 2024.

Physics

The students of the *Department of Physics* made a project on "Electromagnetic Induction" on *National Science Day* which was celebrated on 28 February 2024.

Chemistry

On *National Science Day*, the *Department of Chemistry* made a project, which rendered 3D versions of Organic Compounds.

Computer Science

The students of the *Department of Computer Science* made a project on "IOT based applications" on *National Science Day* which was celebrated on 28 February 2024.

Public Administration

The students of the *Department of Public Administration* made several models on the overarching theme of "Administration Then and Now" which were put up for display in a mega exhibition held on 30 November 2023. The four main highlights of the event were models on: Ancient Administration, Administration of local deity, present district administration and local government institutions.

Sociology

The students of the *Department of Sociology* made models on the theme "Cultural Heritage of Theog" and showcased them in a mega cultural exhibition held on 30 November 2023. The students also put on display the local artefacts used by their

ancestors since past several hundred years including jewellery, agricultural implements, local coins and household items

History

Political Science

The students of the *Department of Political Science* made several models which depicted the theme “Political Systems: Governance and Governability.”

Computer Science

The students of the *Department of Computer Science* made and presented a project on “IOT based applications” on *National Science Day* celebrated on 28 February 2024.

Educational Tours/Field Visit

Chemistry

Four students of the *Department of Chemistry* undertook a field visit to Science City Kapurthala under DBT Star College Scheme in collaboration with GC Sanjauli from 21 to 23 November 2023.

Zoology

The students of the *Department of Zoology* undertook a field visit on 5 November 2023 to study the fauna and local biodiversity of Theog and understand its ecological significance.

The students of the *Department of Zoology* in collaboration with the *Red Ribbon Club* undertook a training program at RKMV on AIDS Awareness on 20 November 2023. The major sub-themes dealt with in the training were transmission, prevention & stigma associated with HIV/AIDS.

Botany

The students of the *Department of Botany* undertook a field visit on 5 November 2023 to study the flora of Theog and understand various plants with medicinal properties that exist in the region.

Public Administration

On 27 October 2023, the students of the *Department of Public Administration* undertook a field visit to *Indian Institute of Advanced Studies (IIAS)*, *Himachal Pradesh Institute of Public Administration (HIPA)* & *State Museum, Shimla*. They witnessed the training of freshly recruited administrative officers. The other major objective of the visit was to understand and witness British administrative legacies to Indian administration. In their visit to the *State Museum*, the students got a glimpse of the art, history and culture of HP and India and they also got to learn different aspects of museum administration and its importance.

On 21 November 2023, the students of the *Department of Public Administration* undertook a field visit to the local *SDM* office to familiarize themselves with the functioning of the local administration. They visited the court room too.

Economics

The final year students of the *Department of Economics* visited the *State Bank of India (SBI)* branch at Theog with an objective to witness firsthand banking operations.

Geography

The *Department of Geography*, to instill consciousness regarding rapid degradation of

the environment due to anthropogenic activities, organised multiple tree plantation activities on 3 August and 10 August 2023.

Industrial Visit

Under the auspices of the *Career Counselling and Placement Cell (CCPC)*, several students visited the *Industrial Training Institute (ITI)* at Theog on 28 February 2024. They witnessed first-hand several trades in which the students were receiving training in job-oriented courses.

Workshops

Political Science

The *Department of Political Science* in collaboration with the *Electoral Literacy Club* organised a “Chunav Pathshala” on 18 November 2023 in which local representatives of the *Election Commission of India (ECI)* too were present. In the workshop, hands on training on EVM was given. Another major outcome of the workshop was to promote awareness about democratic processes and emphasize the importance of active participation in elections.

Public Administration

The *Department of Public Administration* organised a one-week workshop from 30 November 2023 to 6 December 2023. The overarching theme of the workshop was “Administration Then and now.” The Resource Persons for the workshop were Prof Mamta Mokta, Professor of Public Administration, Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, Sub Divisional Magistrate (SDM) Theog Mr. Mukesh Sharma and Dr Kokila Negi, Associate Professor of Commerce, Atma Ram Sanatan Dharam College, University of Delhi.

Commerce

The *Department of Commerce* organised a workshop on “Financial Literacy” 30 November 2023.

Women Cell

On 5 August 2023, the *Women Cell* of the college organised a workshop on the theme “Health and Hygiene.” The Resource Person for the workshop was Dr Isha Chauhan (MBBS). Apart from emphasizing how indispensable and intertwined health and hygiene were, she also underscored the importance of breast feeding. Ms. Rita Thakur, counsellor for adolescent health, was also present on the occasion.

On 8 August 2023, the *Women Cell* of the college organised a workshop on “Gender Sensitization” The Resource Person for the session was Dr Anuja Sharma and she spoke at length on gender equity.

Career Counselling & Placement Cell (CCPC)

On 4 August 2023, the CCPC organised a one-day workshop on “Career opportunities after Graduation.” The Resource Person for the session was Mrs. Seema Gupta, District Employment Officer, Shimla and Mrs. Aarti Thakur, from the Regional Employment Office & HP-KVN Shimla.

From 26 February to 2 March 2024, a one-week workshop on “Skill Enhancement” was organised by the CCPC.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The IQAC organised a one-week *Faculty Development Program (FDP)* on “Quality Assessment & AQAR” from 4 November to 10 November 2023. The main aim of the

session was to give a fresh boost to the preparation of the college for the impending peer-team visit in the year 2025 and to raise awareness among the staff members regarding the complexities and intricacies of maintaining, evaluating and claiming quality for better grading.

Road Safety Club (RSC)

The *Road Safety Club* of the college organised a workshop on 9 December 2023 in which two external Resource Persons were invited: Dr Baburam, Department of General Surgery, IGMC Shimla and Mr. Kulbir Singh, Station House Officer (SHO), Police Station, Theog.

Internal Assessment Mechanism (Quizzes, Class Test, Presentation, Assignments, MTT etc.)

The college follows the CBCS template prescribed by the affiliating university for evaluation. The evaluation criterions comprise of two components:

1. CCA (*Continuous Comprehensive Assessment*) of 30 %
- 2 Final Examination of 70 %.

The breakup of Internal Assessment as per the norms of *Himachal Pradesh University* is as follows:

- 1) 10 marks in the overall CCA of 30 are reserved for the students' performance in the Mid-term Examination which are held in the month of December after at least 75% of the syllabus is covered in each subject.
- 2) 5 marks are reserved for the students' performance in the class tests, which could be in written form as 'class tests' or as 'quizzes.'
- 3) 10 marks are reserved for Assignments and Projects, which are to be presented in the departmental/course seminars.
- 4) 5 marks are reserved for Attendance. Attendance marks are distributed based on Attendance % slab as per the norms of Himachal Pradesh University which is as follows:
 - (i) 95% and above: 5 marks
 - (ii) 90%-94%: 4 marks
 - (iii) 85%-89%: 3 marks
 - (iv) 80%-84%: 2marks
 - (v) 75%-79%: 1mark
5. The students are briefed about the mechanism of 'Internal Assessment' and evaluation at the very outset to enhance transparency. The evaluated answer scripts of mid-term examinations are shown to the students. Internal assessment is displayed on the noticeboard and shared in the subject-specific Whatsapp groups and the issues pertaining to assessment, if any, are resolved by the teacher concerned. The final internal assessment is uploaded by the teachers on the university portal in accordance with the guidelines of *Himachal Pradesh University*. Thus, the whole process is objective and devoid of any bias on the part of the teacher or the institution.

Prompt Communication of Assessment/Results to Students (displayed on college website/ class groups/ submitted to COE)

The evaluated answer scripts of mid-term examinations are shown to the students. The cumulative Internal assessment (IA/CCA) is displayed on the notice board and shared

4	<p>Student Feedback (taken from students with 80% attendance) Sample Size: Student Satisfaction: Overall, the college's syllabi and curriculum design and its implementation have garnered a positive response from students, who appreciate the extent to which teachers cover the syllabi throughout the academic year. Many students' expressed satisfaction with the effective delivery of lectures, although a small number felt that the content delivery did not fully meet their expectations. The teaching methodologies employed by the faculty generally received favourable reviews; however, only 6% of students believed that the instructional resources available in the classroom can be further improved.</p> <p>The processes implemented by the college for assessment and evaluation are largely viewed as fair, transparent, and efficient, though 7.5 % of students feel there is room for improvement in this area. ICT Facilities

To provide world class teaching learning experience to the students, the college augments conventional classroom teaching with ICT enabled teaching. The IT facilities provided by college include 14 Interactive panels/LCD projectors installed in classrooms and labs, 87 computers and 04 laptops, one dedicated 10 MBPS leased line, 01 well established computer laboratory, a language lab with Wi-Fi enabled LED panel with LAN connection to enhance language/communication skills and a centralized GIS/browsing centre with LAN/Wi-Fi connectivity. 1	<p>Best Practices Description & Outcome of the Best Practices (at least two):</p> <p>Practice Number 1: "Community Engagement and Social Impact Program (CESIP)"</p> <p>Objectives: CESIP is a regular and most cherished feature of college life at GC Theog. The main aim is to engage students in social outreach initiatives, promoting civic responsibility, community development, and awareness on various societal issues.</p> <p>Practice: The NSS unit of the college routinely organizes diverse activities like conduct of “electoral literacy education programs”, “adoption of a village”, and awareness campaigns on road safety, drug abuse, and periodic blood donation camps. These initiatives have significantly impacted the community, fostering social responsibility among students.</p> <p>Evidence of Success: Increased participation in social outreach programs, positive community feedback, and measurable impact on road safety awareness, health campaigns, and environmental conservation indicate the success of CESIP in engaging students and making a meaningful impact on society.</p> <p>Practice Number 2: "Sustainable Campus Initiatives (SCI)"</p> <p>Objectives of the Practice: SCI focuses on environmental preservation, promoting cleanliness, sustainable practices, and creating an eco-friendly campus environment.</p> <p>Practice: Cleanliness drives inside and outside the campus are a regular feature. We maintain a botanical garden with medicinal plants, enforce a plastic-free policy, operate a bio-compost pit, and beautify the campus through plantation drives and floral arrangements.</p> <p>Evidence of Success: Visible improvement in campus cleanliness, increased green cover, reduced plastic usage, and successful waste management showcase the positive</p>

2	<p>Special Initiatives taken For:</p> <p>(1) Energy Conservation/Use of Solar Energy The college has undertaken several steps for energy conservation. In order to conserve the energy, fluorescent tube lamps and LED lamps are used in all the classrooms, laboratories and in the administrative office as well. Students are sensitized to ensure timely switch on and off the switches to reduce unnecessary power consumption. Apart from that “Switch off drills” are practiced in the rooms by both staff and students. The college building is designed in such a way that maximum use of day light is made possible in all the classrooms and departments. Five Solar powered Lights are installed in the campus at various places. Further, the college also plans to purchase and install a Solar Panel from the next due instalment of RUSA as decided in IQAC 4th quarterly meeting held on 15th May 2024.</p> <p>(2) Solid Waste Segregation/Management Waste management is one of the burning problems not only in India but also in the world. Hence it is necessary to use the things properly and manage them cautiously. The college ensures appropriate segregation by managing and discarding campus waste in an efficient manner. Using blue and green dustbins, the waste is collected every day and divided into dry and wet categories. The <i>Municipal Corporation of Theog</i> collects non-biodegradable waste using special dustbins. The municipal sewage system is used for the proper disposal of liquid waste. Clubs such as the Eco Club, NSS, and NCC regularly organise plays, rallies, and competitions to promote environmental awareness. In accordance with the one-month Swachh Bharat 2.0 Programme, the NSS Volunteers of G.D.C. THEOG initiated a cleanliness drive and held a Swachh Bharat Rally in campus. Biodegradable waste is decomposed in the composting unit in campus; the resultant compost is utilised for gardening in Botanical glass house.</p> <p>(3) Rainwater Harvesting and its use for Gardening and Cleanliness</p>

Water conservation facilities are available in the Institution. Rainwater/Roof top rainwater is collected in the tank earmarked for water harvesting. The stored water is utilised in the toilets and also for irrigation of plants in the botanical glass house. We have medicinal herbs, ornamental plants and other shrubs in the botanical glass house. The rainwater harvesting tank caters to the need of these plants especially in the days of water scarcity in the summer. This tank not only caters to our water needs but saves our valuable soil from erosion.

(4) Plastic Free Campus

The use of plastic in the college is minimal. The staff and the students are discouraged to use one time use plastic, plastic bags and disposable plastic things throughout the campus. To ensure a plastic free campus, clubs like the Eco club, NSS, and NCC organize plays, rallies, and competitions with themes such as "Say No to Plastic". Such programme helps to raise the level of awareness among the college students.

(5) Blood Donation Camps

A *Blood Donation Camp* was organized on 5th December 2023 by the Red Ribbon Club of the college in collaboration with the NSS Unit of the college and Blood Bank, IGMC Shimla. The event aimed to raise awareness about the importance of blood donation and encourage individuals to contribute towards saving lives through voluntary blood donations. During the blood donation campaign, 32 units of blood was collected. Certificates of the appreciation were given to all the donors. Dr Meghna and her team from IGMC Shimla were instrumental in the successful organization of the Blood Donation Camp.

(6) Adoption of Village/Educational Institution

The NSS unit of our college has adopted the village "Bagaghat," Gram panchayat Basa, Theog and also Ward no. 4 of MC Theog. Some of the objectives of the practice as envisaged were:

- (a) To develop the adopted Village/ward as an ideal village/ward of the area.
- (b) To make people aware of the basic healthcare and hygiene
- (c) To sensitize them about the problems such as soil and water pollution.

	<p>(d) To motivate them to take proper measures for the education of girl child.</p> <p>A week-long special camp was organized in the adopted village/ward. A survey was also conducted on sanitation, general health check-up and literacy. 3	<p>Social Impact of Extension Activities: (On the basis of Community Feedback)</p> <p>Through extension programs, the institution helps students to develop their problem-solving abilities and increase their understanding of social issues. Different societies of the college organize activities for community development, including environment protection, humanitarian services, and social awareness. This academic year, the college conducted tree plantation drives, a blood donation camp and several cleanliness drives.</p> <p>3.1 Social Impact of Tree plantation: The multiple tree plantation drives had a significant social impact by promoting environmental awareness and community participation. It involved students and volunteers of various clubs and society of the college and contributed in fostering a collective sense of responsibility toward nature. By planting over 150 trees, the initiative aimed to combat climate change, reduce air pollution, and enhance biodiversity. The drive also educated participants about the importance of trees in sustaining ecosystems and improving air quality. It encouraged long-term stewardship of green spaces and instilled a sense of pride in contributing to a healthier environment.</p> <p>3.2 The social impact of blood donation: The blood donation camp organized by the <i>Red Ribbon Club</i> and the NSS Unit of the college had a significant social impact. It raised awareness about the importance of donating blood. Over 32 donors donated the blood, thus ameliorating the shortage of blood in the blood-bank of IGMC. The event fostered a sense of social responsibility and unity among students, staff, and the external facilitators from IGMC. Additionally, it encouraged a culture of voluntary blood donation, which can save lives in emergencies.</p>

	<p>The camp not only contributed to healthcare but also promoted a spirit of compassion and service within the community.</p> <p>3.3 Social impact of a cleanliness drives</p> <p>The cleanliness drive had a notable social impact in fostering a sense of civic responsibility and hygiene awareness among the stakeholders in the college. Involving students and volunteers of different clubs and societies of the college, the drive aimed to clean common spaces in the college campus and the adopted village of ‘Baghaghat’, and the adopted “Ward No 4” under MC Theog. It not only improved the visual appeal of the environment but also educated people on the importance of proper waste disposal and sanitation. The drive helped reduce pollution, promoted healthier living conditions, and instilled a sense of pride in maintaining a clean environment. 4	<p>Special New Innovative Initiatives or Ideas Adopted in the College (other than at Serial Number 5.2 above)</p> <p>1. Interdisciplinary Exhibition on Historical and Cultural Heritage:</p> <p>An interdisciplinary exhibition was organized by the college bringing together the departments of History, Political Science, Public Administration, Sociology, and Music. Each department showcased its unique contributions to understanding society, especially its rich culture, heritage, traditions and the lifestyle of the ancestors.</p> <p>(a) Department of Sociology:</p> <p>The exhibition put up by the Department of <i>Sociology</i> highlighted traditional costumes, food, and other cultural elements. The event aimed to showcase the vibrant cultural heritage of the region, with a focus on local attire, culinary traditions, and everyday artifacts. Students displayed traditional clothing, different local foods, traditional cereals and utensils used in cooking. The exhibition also featured discussions on the sociological significance of these traditions, emphasizing their role in shaping identity and community values.</p>

(b) Department of History:

The Department of History put up an exhibition showcasing traditional artifacts. This event aimed to celebrate and preserve the rich cultural heritage of the region, offering students and the community a glimpse into the past. The exhibition featured a diverse collection of traditional items, including handicrafts, tools, traditional pottery, coins and textiles reflecting the customs and craftsmanship of the local artisans. It served as an educational platform for students to learn about history through tangible objects, fostering a deeper appreciation for cultural heritage and its relevance in contemporary society.

(c) Department of Political Science and Public Administration:

The *Departments of Political Science and Public Administration* jointly organized an insightful exhibition on "Governance, Governability, and Policy Making." The exhibition aimed to create awareness and foster a deeper understanding of the processes involved in governance and policy formulation, as well as the challenges related to governability. The event highlighted the significance of good governance in modern societies. Several models showcased the evolution of governance system and the role of institutions. Interactive displays and charts emphasized the importance of transparency, accountability, and citizen participation in policy-making processes. Overall, the exhibition provided a comprehensive look at the intricacies of governance and policymaking, inspiring students to consider careers in public administration and related fields.

(d) Department of Music

The *Department of Music* organized an exhibition featuring traditional musical instruments, celebrating the region's rich heritage linked to folk music. The event showcased a wide variety of indigenous instruments such as the dhol, shehnai, Ranshingha, Sarod, and Tambura, along with lesser-known instruments from local folk traditions. Students and visitors had the opportunity to explore the history and craftsmanship behind these instruments, with live demonstrations that highlighted their unique sounds. The exhibition also emphasized the cultural significance of traditional music in local rituals and festivals. It was a successful event, drawing a large audience and fostering great appreciation for the region's musical traditions.

	<p>2. Orientation of Students to use ICT enabled infrastructure of the College:</p> <p>All the teaching departments of the college insist on students’ assignment presentation on smartboards. It is pertinent to mention here that the institution has 14 internet-enabled smartboards. The students are taught to switch it on and off, transfer presentations, switch between the operating system and whiteboard to explain their slides. In all the major national and international days celebrated in the institution, power point presentations is a recurring feature and students exhibit their potential to the fullest. The students have even made a documentary depicting the infrastructure progress made in the institution and the video is available on the college website. The student: computer ratio of the institution is among the best vis-à-vis other colleges of the State.</p> <p>3. To further cement holistic development of students, equal emphasis on non-native games such as Basketball:</p> <p>In spite of being located in a rural area, the college leaves no stone unturned to provide infrastructure such as a state-of-the-art basketball court, which is not present in many of the colleges situated at District headquarters. The students were provided with state level exposure as the college hosted HP University Inter-College Basketball Championship (W) in the academic session 2023-24. Likewise, the college has a dedicated cricket pitch with nets for practise and an ultra-modern state-of-the-art bowling machine apart from a functional gymnasium.</p> <p>4.
