

The college has 17 smartboard-equipped classrooms, and all faculty members actively utilize these digital resources to deliver content, demonstrate concepts, and facilitate interactive learning. Blended teaching has significantly improved student participation and comprehension.</p> <p>Flipped Classroom Approach</p> <p>To promote higher-order thinking and active learning, departments periodically adopt the flipped classroom model. Students are provided with pre-class readings, videos, or digital materials, enabling them to engage in collaborative problem-solving and enriched discussions during class hours. This method has enhanced classroom participation and independent learning skills.</p> <p>Faculty Profile and Academic Support</p> <p>The college has 24 qualified and experienced full-time faculty members who maintain professional commitment and accountability in the learning process. Faculty members regularly assess students through assignments, classroom participation, tests, and interactive sessions.</p> <p>Remedial classes</p> <p>Special attention is given to slow learners. Remedial classes and tutorial sessions are conducted to support their academic progress. Records of identified students and additional instructional hours are systematically maintained to monitor improvement and progression.</p> <p>Student-Centric Learning Activities:</p> <p>To ensure effective learning, departments regularly organize, Classroom discussions, Student presentations, Quizzes and classroom assessments, Demonstrations, and practical sessions in well-equipped laboratories. This calendar systematically incorporates curricular, co-curricular, and extra-curricular activities to ensure smooth academic functioning.</p> <p>Whether Learning Outcomes Defined Yes. The Program Outcomes (POs), Course Outcomes (COs), and Learning Outcomes (LOs) are clearly outlined for each subject and course. These outcomes are made available on the college website through hyperlinks. They are also explained in detail during the Orientation cum Induction Programme for first-year students organized in the beginning of Academic Session. Furthermore, teachers revisit and discuss these outcomes extensively in their respective classes. Students are provided a 10-day period at the beginning of the session to change their Elective course, should they wish to do so.</p> <p>Curriculum Enrichment Activities (Projects, Surveys, Educational Tours and Industry Visits) (Projects, Surveys, Educational Tours and Industry Visits) The faculty thoroughly believes in the merits of experiential learning.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Projects</u></p> <p>1. Department of Zoology:- The Zoology students of Government Degree College, Theog, prepared a series of creative and academically meaningful projects and models as part of their coursework like 'from egg to moth: the life cycle of the silkworm,; 'hemodialysis therapy, focusing on improved approaches to patient care. '; "The Engine Of Life: Understanding The Human Heart, "; the physiology of the human kidneys, emphasizing their roles in filtration and homeostasis. Numerical mutations, amphibians, circulation, economic importance of insects etc.</p> <p>2. Department of Botany: - Students of the Botany Department, Government Degree College, Theog, prepared a series of creative models and projects on mushroom cultivation, greenhouse technology, rainwater harvesting, botanical garden development, ecosystem, soil, apomixis and related themes.</p> <p>4. Department of Chemistry: - The Chemistry Department organized an inter-class project-making activity aimed at strengthening students' understanding of fundamental concepts and facts in organic chemistry. The event was well planned, providing students with an excellent opportunity to revisit, discuss, and clarify key ideas in the subject. 5. Department of Physics: The Physics students prepared a project on Electromagnetic Induction.

Lectures

1. Informative Session on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR)

An informative session on Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) was organized by the Career Counseling and Placement Cell on 26 September 2024. The resource person, Mr. Akarsh Sharma, Risk Consultant at PWC and an alumnus of Shoolini University, delivered an insightful lecture on the fundamentals of IPR. He highlighted the importance of protecting innovations and creative works across various fields. The session aimed to enhance students' understanding of patents, copyrights, trademarks, and their significance in fostering innovation.

2. Lecture on Adolescent Health and Gender Sensitization

The Women Cell of Government Degree College (GDC) Theog organized a lecture on 4 December 2024 on Adolescent Health and Gender Sensitization. The session was conducted by Dr. Sahil, Indira Gandhi Medical College (IGMC), Shimla. He provided valuable insights into the physical, emotional, and psychological changes experienced during adolescence and emphasized the importance of gender sensitivity in educational institutions.

3. Talk on 'Healthful Eating'

The Women Cell of GDC Theog conducted a talk on 8 March 2025 to promote healthy lifestyle practices among students. Dr. Bhupinder Singh Thakur, Principal of GDC, served as the resource person. He stressed the importance of a balanced diet and explained how essential nutrients, vitamins, and minerals contribute to overall well-being. He also discussed health risks associated with imbalanced diets, including obesity, malnutrition, and chronic diseases.

4. Lecture on Cyber Security and Online Fraud Prevention

The IQAC of GDC Theog organized a lecture on "Safeguarding Digital Lives: Cyber Security and Protection Against Online Frauds" on 26 September 2024. Mr. Arun Popli, Senior Branch Manager, SBI, educated participants about different types of cyber frauds, tactics used by cybercriminals, and preventive measures to stay safe in the digital environment.

5. Lecture on Substance Abuse Awareness

Vyaktiva Foundation conducted an awareness lecture at GDC Theog on 6 August 2024, focusing on the harmful effects of substance use. A total of 170 students from BSc, BCom, and BA participated actively. The session aimed to discourage substance abuse and promote healthy lifestyle choices among youth.

6. Lecture on the POSH Act

On 8 March 2025, marking International Women's Day, Advocate Aditi Sharma, an expert in International Law, delivered an insightful lecture on the POSH Act. She discussed various forms of sexual harassment, key provisions of the Act, and the role of the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC). The interactive session enhanced awareness about workplace safety and the legal mechanisms available for protection.

7. HIV/AIDS Awareness and Prevention Training

A specialized HIV/AIDS awareness and prevention training session was organized at the Centre of Excellence, Sanjauli, on 28 November 2024 for students of GDC Theog. The session covered causes, modes of transmission, prevention strategies, and stigma

reduction. Dr. Nidhi Dhatwalia, Convenor of the Red Ribbon Club, accompanied the student participants.

Field Visits / Educational Tours

1. Educational Visit to All India Radio (AIR), Shimla

The Department of Music organized a field visit to All India Radio (AIR), Shimla, on 15 November 2024. A group of 20 students gained hands-on exposure to the techniques of radio broadcasting, including recording, mixing, and sound engineering. Dr. Hukam Sharma, Senior Announcer at AIR and a renowned flute artist, guided students through various recording processes and demonstrated live phonics and program recording methods.

2. Field Visit to Himalayan Nature Park, Kufri

The Department of Geography organized a field visit to the Himalayan Nature Park, Kufri, on 22 November 2024. The visit aimed to study the region's biodiversity and understand its significance in ecological conservation. Students explored various flora and fauna species and learned about conservation practices adopted within the park.

Surveys

1. Political Science Field Survey on Local Governance

The Department of Political Science conducted a comprehensive field survey in the Theog Constituency to evaluate local governance and governability. A total of 58 students interacted with local residents to collect data on political participation, access to government schemes, and the functioning of local administrative bodies.

2. Economics Department Field Survey

Second-year Economics (DSC) students conducted a field survey in the nearby Panchayat area of Devrighat under the Community Development Block, Theog. The objective was to provide hands-on experience in understanding concepts such as income, output, and employment. Given financial and logistical constraints, the study area was selected purposively, and simple statistical tools such as averages and percentages were used for data analysis.

Workshops/Seminars

1. One-Day Science Workshop for School Students

The Science Faculty of Government Degree College (GDC) Theog organized a one-day workshop on 25 February for 20 students of Government Senior Secondary School, Sandhu, accompanied by their teachers. Dr. Bhupinder Singh Thakur, Principal of GDC Theog, graced the occasion as the Chief Guest and congratulated the faculty for this initiative. The workshop aimed to expose school students to diverse scientific fields and motivate them to pursue scientific learning. Activities included PPT presentations, scientific model demonstrations, a science and technology quiz, and laboratory visits across various departments. The program proved highly engaging and informative for the participants.

2. Workshop-cum-Hands-On Training on Latest Trends and Techniques in Sciences

The Faculty of Science, GDC Theog, in collaboration with J.P. University, organized a Workshop-Cum-Hands-On-Training session on 9 November 2024. The event aimed to familiarize students and faculty with recent scientific developments and provide

practical exposure to modern laboratory techniques. The workshop was held in the presence of Principal Dr. Bhupinder Singh Thakur, who appreciated the initiative and encouraged students to engage in research-based learning. The resource person was Prof. (Dr.) Sudhir Kumar, Head of Biotechnology and Bioinformatics at J.P. University, a distinguished scientist who led the sessions with expertise.

3. Workshop on Mental Health and Wellness

The Women Cell of GDC Theog organized a workshop on Mental Health and Wellness on 12 March 2025. Its objective was to educate students about mental health, stress management, and overall well-being.

The workshop included:

- A lecture on mental health and coping strategies
- Practical demonstrations of coping techniques
- A documentary screening
- An interactive session

4. Workshop on Physical Fitness

A workshop on Physical Fitness was conducted in the college, during which the Principal, Dr. Bhupinder Singh Thakur, interacted with students. He highlighted the importance of a healthy lifestyle and urged students to adopt regular exercise and balanced nutrition. His motivational session encouraged students to prioritize physical well-being along with their academic pursuits.

5. Online Workshop on “Creativity through Different Art Forms”

The Department of English organized a one-day online workshop on 4 October 2024 titled “Creativity Through Different Art Forms.” The program was designed for students interested in creative expressions such as collage making, poster making, and on-the-spot painting. Dr. Bhader Singh (PhD), Assistant Professor of Painting, RKMV Shimla, was the resource person. He also introduced students to other artistic forms including photography, rangoli, and cartooning. Dr. Singh assured continued support for GDC Theog students through future mentoring sessions, both online and offline.

6. Workshop on “Electoral Literacy”

The Electoral Literacy Club of GDC Theog organized a workshop on 13 November 2025 to promote youth participation in the democratic process and raise awareness about the significance of voting. Election officials—including the Booth Level Officer (BLO), supervisor, and coordinator—supported the event by helping students with voter registration and issuance of voter IDs. The workshop was highly beneficial for the students, and the college was appreciated for its initiative in empowering young voters and bridging civic awareness gaps.

7. Seminar on “Career Opportunities After Undergraduation”

The Career Counseling and Placement Cell, in collaboration with UTOPIA Learning Resources, conducted a one-day seminar on 18 October 2024. The session focused on career opportunities available after graduation. Representatives from UTOPIA Learning Resources motivated students to begin early career preparation and provided detailed guidance on the syllabus and exam pattern of UPSC and HAS examinations.

8. Career Counseling Session with Chitkara University

On 22 February 2025, the Career Counseling and Placement Cell (CCPC) organized an interactive career counseling session in collaboration with Chitkara University, Chandigarh. A total of 120 students from B.A., B.Sc., and B.Com. third year

participated. Mr. Kiran, Senior Director, addressed the students, sharing valuable insights and explaining various technical methodologies and strategies useful for preparing for competitive examinations after graduation.

Internal Assessment Mechanism (Quizzes, Class Test, Presentation, Assignments, MTT etc.)

Internal Assessment Mechanism (Quizzes, Class Tests, Presentations, Assignments, MTT, etc.)

The college adheres to the CBCS evaluation framework prescribed by the affiliating university. The overall assessment consists of two components:

Continuous Comprehensive Assessment (CCA) – 30%

Final Examination – 70%

The CCA component of 30% is structured as per the guidelines of Himachal Pradesh University and is divided as follows:

Mid-Term Examination (10 marks): Conducted in December after completion of at least 75% of the syllabus in each subject.

Class Tests/Quizzes (5 marks): Based on students' performance in periodic written tests or quizzes.

Assignments & Projects (10 marks): Students submit assignments and present their project work during departmental or course seminars.

Attendance (5 marks): Awarded according to the following university-approved attendance slabs:

95% and above: 5 marks

90%–94%: 4 marks

85%–89%: 3 marks

80%–84%: 2 marks

75%–79%: 1 mark

To maintain transparency, students are informed about the Internal Assessment system at the beginning of the session. Evaluated mid-term answer scripts are shown to them, and the Internal Assessment details are displayed on the notice board as well as circulated in subject-specific WhatsApp groups. Any concerns raised by students are promptly addressed by the concerned teacher.

The final Internal Assessment is uploaded by teachers on the university portal in accordance with Himachal Pradesh University norms. This ensures that the entire assessment process remains fair, transparent, and free from bias at both the teacher and institutional levels.

Prompt Communication of Assessment/Results to Students

The evaluated answer scripts of the mid-term examinations are shown to students to ensure transparency and clarity regarding their performance. The cumulative Internal Assessment (IA/CCA) is displayed on the college notice board and also shared through subject-specific WhatsApp groups for easy access. Any concerns or discrepancies related to the assessment are addressed promptly by the concerned teacher. Wherever required, re-tests are conducted in the month of February to give students an opportunity to improve their performance.

Overall, students conveyed a positive and satisfactory learning experience. Most rated it as Good to Excellent, suggesting that the teaching-learning environment of the college is student-friendly, academically oriented, and conducive to holistic development.

A sensitization lecture on the fight against drug abuse was conducted on 06/08/2024 in collaboration with Vyaktitava Foundation, where Major Vikas Kadsholi, Mr. Kulpreet Saini, and Ms. Arunima Sharma addressed around 150 participants, highlighting the social and psychological consequences of substance abuse. To further strengthen community outreach, a Drug Addiction Awareness Rally was organized in Theog Market on 15/02/2025, witnessing active participation of about 120 students and volunteers. This was followed by expert lectures on 19/02/2025 by Dr. Sanjay Sharma, Chairperson, Nagar Parishad, Theog, and Sh. Siddharth Sharma, DSP Theog, each engaging nearly 150 participants and emphasizing preventive measures, legal aspects, and the role of youth in building a drug-free society. Additionally, a drug awareness song performed by Dr. Mohinder Rathour during the session 2024–25 sensitized nearly 300 individuals, using music as an effective medium to convey the message against drug abuse.

2.7.i No. of health/sensitisation programmes organised

ICT Facilities

To provide world class teaching learning experience to the students, the college augments conventional classroom teaching with ICT enabled teaching. The IT facilities provided by college include 17 Interactive panels/LCD projectors installed in classrooms and labs, 87 computers and 04 laptops, one dedicated 10 MBPS leased line, 01 well established computer laboratory, a language lab with Wi-Fi enabled LED panel with LAN connection to enhance language/communication skills and a centralized GIS/browsing centre with LAN/Wi-Fi connectivity. Secured LAN/Wi-Fi access has been provided to all users in 10 lecture halls/classrooms and 06 laboratories. The conference Hall is also enabled with Wi-Fi and an LED/Smart board. Wi-Fi facility having speeds up to 10 MBPS has been provided in the campus. All these resources are well utilized by the staff and students to make teaching and learning meaningful.




5.2.3 Collaborations with District Library Theog
